

Welcome to the Sixth Annual International Colloquium on Black Males in Education! Representing Wisconsin's Equity & Inclusion Laboratory at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and the Todd Anthony Bell National Resource Center on the African American Male at The Ohio State University, we are both delighted to have this year's colloquium in Toronto, Canada.

Toronto is one of the world's most diverse, multicultural cities. It has long been, and continues to, persist as a destination for Black immigrants in Canada. While Blacks can be found throughout Canada, most are found in urban areas, such as Toronto. Similar to urban cities in the United States and other parts of the world, many Blacks, especially males, are not living optimally. There is growing concerns about the educational, social, and economic statuses of Black males in Canada.

We coordinate papers, presentations, and panels – like in previous years – that reflect a wide range of disciplinary fields (e.g., history, sociology, psychology, STEM, etc.), educational topics, and every juncture of the educational continuum (e.g., elementary, secondary, and postsecondary levels).

We are excited about this year's Colloquium. We hope that you will immerse yourself in the Colloquium experience and absorb the many nuggets from the scheduled presentations, panels, keynote addresses, and networking activities.



Round Table

The Policy Round Table is an invitation-only event designed for key decision-makers most well-positioned to inform policies impacting Black males in Toronto. Led by Dr. Jerlando F. L. Jackson, Dr. Damon A. Williams, and Warren Salmon, this working meeting will expose attendees to the transformational power of collective impact for community and school-based movements to improve educational outcomes for Black male youth. Specifically, the focus will be: *Leveraging Collective Impact to Improve the Lives of Black Male Youth*.

Conversations

Parent-Youth Summit

The Colloquium Conversations is a forum open to the local community and their families. The community forum is titled "I Want My Children to Do Better than Me: Preparing Today's Youth for Tomorrow's Workforce Leadership Summit." The conversation will be led by Dr. Damon A. Williams, one of the world's leading authorities on youth development and social impact.

This leadership summit is for community members, educators, policy makers, leaders, and parents and their children interested in empowering today's youth to lead and be productive citizens in tomorrow's workforce. The session will utilize the methods that Dr. Williams used to rewrite the program portfolio for the Boys & Girls Clubs of America, where he served as Senior Vice President and Chief Education Officer for four years. During this session, participants will gain tools to help youth and teens, particularly young men, in: setting goals, finding their purpose, living with a growth mindset, showing grit and character in the face of challenges, and focusing on developing 21st-century leadership skills.

Academies

College Academy

The College Academy is a college readiness workshop conducted by pre-college and college experts that will prepare students for competitive admission into higher education institutions. The primary emphasis is placed on the value of postsecondary education, and understanding the variety of college options, college readiness (academic, social, cultural, and personal), college admission assessments, and funding. Participants will reflect, engage, and receive resources to mindfully map and activate their "best self" in preparation for success in higher education. The College Academy will also provide insight into how to access local and international resources and support systems to gain exposure, garner experience, and build a competitive college portfolio. The College Academy is led by Daniel Thomas from The Ohio State University.

Graduate School Academy

As part of the Colloquium Academies, the Graduate School Academy (GSA) aims to provide opportunities for undergraduate participants that extend beyond institutional and national boundaries through presentations and workshops designed to enhance their academic and professional profiles. Led by Dr. LaVar J. Charleston, of the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, and Dr. Robert A. Bennett III, of The Ohio State University, faculty and staff from a variety of academic and administrative positions will cover themes such as: (a) graduate school preparation, challenges and opportunities; (b) implications for future academic careers; and (c) developing action plans for future collaborations and initiatives to enhance Black graduate students' educational experiences. While undergraduate students are a primary target of the GSA, graduate students and professionals alike will benefit from these workshops as they not only allow students to interact with peers, faculty, and staff from various institutions, they also enable participants to develop a global network of contacts while examining the experiences of Black undergraduate and graduate students throughout the world.




